Letter from the editor





Letter from the Reverend Beverley Vincent

September is here and we prepare once again to enjoy the colours of autumn, the 'seedtime and the harvest' being sung about again in our churches and schools, as we recognise the familiarity of the turning of the seasons.

But the recent heat wave and drought in parts of Britain and also in significant areas of the globe have meant that the browned dry grassland and fields, hedges and verges have been with us for quite some time, with devastating wildfires breaking out across both fields and forests. The seasons seem less defined, the wildlife less prevalent, and the lives we live just a little more precarious perhaps.

We have to ask ourselves, what are we doing to our world and what are we doing to mitigate disaster?

The Millenium Seed Bank at the Royal Botanical Gardens, Kew suggests that two in five plant species are in danger of extinction – not just from this year's drought or fire but as a consequence of our failure to look after our world with respect and the devastating changes to the climate that are happening as a result. The Millenium Seed Project is collecting seeds from as many species across the UK and the world as it can. It will keep them at sub-zero temperatures in specially designed underground flood, bomb and radiation-proof vaults. They currently have over 2.4 billion seeds - and counting! A 'Noah's Ark' of seeds for the future, should we need it.

The seed is so important for the future of our world, so important for our survival, so important to God that we should be mindful to make sure that we do our best to protect and preserve it.

This autumn perhaps we could find the space and time to reflect on the precariousness of our ecosystems, to think about how we use the world's resources and to make the changes needed in our own lives to preserve our world. Perhaps also, we could sow, plant or grow something new for God and for the future of our world.



Nature Notes

What an extraordinary summer we are having! As I write we are enduring our second heat wave, this one (only mid-30s) less exhausting than the first, but still a challenge. The garden is a brown swathe, yet the rabbits are still visiting and birds flit about, seemingly unaffected. We ensure there is water available all the time and this must help.

Despite the weather there has been some remarkable sightings since last reporting. Most unexpected was in early July when I photographed a white-letter hairstreak on the Alderford road early in the morning. This is an uncommon butterfly, more so as it is very elusive and can occur undetected, spending much of its time in the canopy of elms, particularly wych elm, where it lays its eggs. Sitting on the road seemed so out of character; I reached out to touch it, but it flew off strongly, much to my delight.



By mid-July birdsong is on the wane, but an unusual melodious song, reminiscent of a blackcap, was followed by a clear view of a garden warbler, my first record for the patch. While fairly common in southern England, the garden warbler has a patchy distribution in Essex. It is a plain pale grey with no distinguishing features and rather secretive, so easily overlooked. The similarity of its song to that of the blackcap also contributes to its relative anonymity. It is always nice to add a new bird to the patch list.

Perhaps the most surprising event was a collection of red kites spotted in a field by a neighbour, who kindly alerted me to the fact. There were five gathered on the ground – they didn't appear to be doing anything in particular and soon took to the air. My neighbour called again later to say she had counted nine on the wing, an astonishing number given they are usually seen in ones or twos.



On a more mundane though no less charming note, the new generation of robins is already starting to sport the red breast that is their hallmark. When first out of the nest they are dark brown with spots, almost thrush-like, and can be mistaken as such. Worth looking out for, they have the robin's shape and habits but not the colours we are used to. Juvenile blue and great tits are also much duller than the adults but they take longer to assume their full splendour.



DAVID OAKES: 1942 - 2022



David Oakes of Great Maplestead sadly passed away on 21st June 2022.

A Chartered Mechanical Engineer by profession, and indeed by thinking, he would say, 'Always do the right thing'. Born and brought up in Beckenham, he left college with an Engineering Diploma, starting work with British Rail, perhaps in some way connected to his lifelong interest in trains.

When David retired in 1996, he and his wife Sue moved to the village, spending much time and effort turning their cottage into their new home with a beautiful garden which was Sue's pride and joy, while David (now a general

garden labourer) definitely enjoyed a cold beer in the garden at the end of the day, watching the sun set over the fields.

David contributed greatly to the community, serving on the Parish Council and co-editing the Village Design Statement, where he spent much time coordinating the team and bringing the work together. He would regularly attend Parish Council Meetings, always ready to ask relevant questions.

He was an active member of the village Task Force, eagerly lending a hand whenever required, ditch clearing and tidying the churchyard, where he could usually be found managing the bonfire. He regularly conducted a solo litter pick round the village, which usually resulted in a 'pit-stop' (or two) for a coffee.

Ready to lend a hand and always good company with a great sense of humour, David was never short of an invitation and his easy company lead him to 'bubble' with his friends and neighbours during the pandemic.

Naturally, he had many interests and kept in regular contact with family, friends and colleagues, often travelling either by train or car to see his daughter Natasha in Yorkshire, his son Trevor in Scotland and regularly flying to New Zealand to see his sister Margaret. David loved walking and travelling and in recent times crossing Australia by train and spending time in Switzerland with friends from the village, including travelling on the Glacier Express, combining trains, scenery and friends all in one activity.

With the many interests he actively pursued, he contributed his time generously and enjoyed life to the full.

David will be missed by all those who were lucky enough to know him.

Gardening Corner

We are experiencing incredibly dry conditions at present and any 'grey' water that can be recycled is a bonus. I find washing-up wate,r collected in a bowl, can revive a flagging shrub in a matter of hours. If you can, water first thing in the morning or mid evening when the sun is low.

Plant of the month for me is the Agapanthus africanus: both the striking blue and white varieties make a bold statement in a flower border. Do read the label when you buy the bulb to make sure your garden can provide the right conditions. Agapanthus tend to like their roots restricted and are ideal grown in a pot; they can then be moved into a cool greenhouse or placed in a sheltered location for the winter. They are on sale at the moment, you will be spoilt for choice.



It is important to continue dead-heading, especially annuals and repeat flowering roses. Look out for lupin aphid and cut the stems right down. Dahlias need to be staked and, if you take out the side shoots, the larger varieties especially will reward you with excellent blooms.

Try and 'wet' your greenhouse floor when watering in the evenings, as this will create humidity and help slow down excess drying out. Continue to dig up second early potatoes and pick French beans, courgettes and spring onions. Main crop potatoes can lifted too; the dry weather has 'crisped' the tops.

Remember, it is important to keep yourself hydrated as well as your plants!



Cookery Corner

Greek Briam (baked mixed vegetables)

A very easy-to-make vegetable dish that can be served on its own with some crusty bread or as a side dish to BBQ meats, especially lamb.

Ingredients:

Greek extra virgin olive oil

6 garlic cloves, sliced

2 tbsps dried oregano

3 sprigs of rosemary

2 tbsps chopped fresh parsley

250ml passata

500g waxy potatoes, peeled

and cut into chunks

2 large courgettes, diced

1 large aubergine, diced

1 large red onion, thickly

chopped

1 large red pepper, cut into

chunks

1 large green pepper, cut into chunks

6 medium tomatoes, chopped into wedges

Method:

Preheat the oven to gas mark 5 (170oC Fan or 190oC).

Drizzle some olive oil into a large roasting tin and spread the potatoes evenly across the base of the tin. Season with salt and pepper.

Add the garlic & courgettes as your next layer and again season with salt and pepper.

Work up the layers, with the aubergine then the peppers and then the onion, seasoning as before between each layer.

Sprinkle 1 tbsp of oregano and 1 tbsp of parsley over the top, then layer on the chopped tomatoes. Add the rest of the herbs and season again.

Pour passata over the top and add 200ml water. Finish with another generous drizzle of olive oil.

Cover the roasting tin tightly with foil and bake for about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours, or until vegetables are tender, then it is ready to serve.

Suitable for 4 people as a main meal, or 6 as a side dish.
