Letter from the Reverend Beverley Vincent

Our world today is one of change and challenge. Last month we were faced with the death of our longest reigning monarch – her late majesty Queen Elizabeth II. A monarch who for many was the only one they had known. A monarch who reigned with great wisdom and diplomacy, who served the nation and commonwealth faithfully throughout her reign and who had a steadfast faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and was not afraid or ashamed to share it with others.

Following her death Prince Charles automatically and immediately became our new monarch. It is understandable that in this time of transition there may be some apprehension and uncertainty as to what kind of king our new monarch King Charles III will be. Although he has had a very public life, supporting many great charities and causes, being willing to speak out and give his own opinion, he knows now as monarch this may no longer be possible.

As well as having a new King, just two days before her late Majesty's death we also witnessed a change in Prime Minister as Boris Johnson left and Liz Truss took up the role.

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

Craft Fair at the Round Church

There were ten different craft stalls as well as our bric-a-brac stall and the tea & cake stall. Visitors were able to browse the stalls and then sit down in the sunshine for a cup of tea or coffee with a choice of hot sausage rolls, meat pies, cheese straws or a large selection of cakes. There was also a very interesting display of the history of our Round Church.

It was gratifying and much appreciated to see so many people turn up and we had a very successful day, raising just over £1000 for the Church. People often comment on the great atmosphere at our events and the chance to catch up with people they may not see very often. None of this could happen without the support of the amazing team of helpers that we have. There are too many to name but everyone who helped in any way deserves a big thank you and, if you want to join us next year, look out for the information. Thank you to everyone who supported this event and see you next year!

Parish Room Project

A meeting was held at The Round Church in July with members of the community to discuss the future of the proposed Parish Room. The meeting was very well attended with 26 people in attendance. Kevin Caddy, representing the Parochial Church Council (PCC), hosted the meeting with the Parish Room Sub Committee, CIIr Bill Piper (Chair, Little Maplestead Parish Council) and Perry Crimmins (Grants Co-ordinator).

Kevin welcomed the evening's speakers, Essex County Councillor Peter Schwier and Perry Crimmins. Kevin began the evening by recapping the history of the Parish Room project and displaying a 3D model of the Parish Room. Councillor Schwier reaffirmed his support for the project and recently assisted with an application for an Essex County Council backed grant of £1000, and committed to providing further support.

Parish Room Project

Perry Crimmins described how Pebmarsh was able to save the village pub by raising the funds required to ensure that thevillage was able to purchase, protect and develop a village asset. The evening concluded with an invitation for questions from the floor.

Subsequently, an extraordinary Parochial Church Councilmeeting was held on the 2nd August to reflect and review the feedback received at the community meeting. The PCC raised concerns about the feasibility of the project. The planning permission from Braintree District Council has recently expired requiring a new application and the new building regulations will increase the anticipated cost of the project by at least one third. The cost of materials and labour are also expected to increase significantly. The Faculty granted by the Diocese of Chelmsford expires in February 2023, a condition is that 80% of funding is in place before any work can commence.

After careful consideration of all the benefits and the issues raised the PCC has decided to pause the project whilst alternative options are considered.

"Meet the Police"

The main issue in the village is speeding vehicles and instances around "near misses" were discussed.

Bill Piper will follow up the meeting with the police by arranging for some / further speeding checks to be carried out and also advise the most likely times.

PCSO John Thorne did bring a speed gun and this was operated for a period of time in Cock Road and all drivers who were monitored were driving within the speed limit!!

Further issues regarding noise – mainly from motorbikes on the Sudbury Road were raised and PCSO John Thorne has stated he would pass this on to the motorcycle team to follow up.

John also explained how the police can be contacted;

He also states that if no one reports anything, then the police do not know what to look out for.

Hare coursing IS a crime, so please phone 999 if you witness it.

Due to demand the Parish Council will now lobby Essex Highways to try to get the 40 limit reduced to 30, and the existing 40 limit to extend along Gestingthorpe Road and Oak Road.

Nature Notes

The heat waves are over, rain has fallen and cooler days are well established. It shouldn't be a relief to see the end of summer, but this autumn is more welcome than most. After 30mm of rain on 25th August, the 26th dawned misty and deliciously cool at 12°C. The Colne was swollen at Hulls Mill and dewladen cobwebs caught the early sun. Birds were quiet but a lone chiffchaff sang, probably the last to



be heard this year. A small group of goldcrests was also heard calling.

A day or two later there was a wonderful surprise when I discovered newly hatched grass snakes under the covers of one of my compost bins. I had discovered adults on several previous occasions (reported in this column), but never young. They were 6-8 inches long, not much thicker than pencils, and very dark – almost black, although they did have a pattern.

The most striking feature was the brilliant gold necklace, the identifying characteristic of all grass snakes, but brilliantly evident on these charismatic youngsters. Adults mate in April and leathery-skinned eggs are laid during June and July. They are laid in batches of up to forty and take about 10 weeks to hatch. The eggs require temperatures of at least 21°C – but preferably 28°C – and high humidity, so rotting vegetation, as found in compost heaps, is a favoured location. When the young hatch they are immediately independent and mine – I had two – remained in the bin over the next couple of weeks before moving away. It was a thrill to see them and my grandchildren were delighted.

The bird feeders have been kept stocked and the common birds appear grateful. Keeping an eye out always pays dividends and rewards have included a lone coal tit, which is now appearing daily. On one morning, after a brief shower, a chiffchaff and then a blackcap were seen foraging for insects. Song thrushes make their presence known in spring and summer with their beautiful, varied song but are elusive by autumn and seldom seen. I was pleased to see one a day or two ago, foraging under a bush.

Another common garden resident, the grey squirrel, is particularly active at this time as they lay up a larder for the winter. A favourite item in our garden is walnuts and our two large trees are laden. The nuts often fall in twos, connected by a forked stem, and the squirrels favour these as they can carry two at a time by grasping the common stem and bounding away with a large walnut either side of the mouth. They make a comical sight as they go about their work. **Patch Patroller**

Gardening Corner

It's the time of year to think about bulbs – most garden centres will have a large and plentiful supply. When planting, make a hole twice the depth of the bulb; tulips can be planted in November, other bulbs and corms at any time over the next two months.

Lavender can have a 'hair cut' with a pair of shears to remove the old flower stalks. If you want to reduce



the bush or hedge, cut back with secateurs just before the old wood; this will make a stronger plant and stop it getting top-heavy.

In the vegetable garden continue picking courgettes, outdoor cucumbers and marrows. Reduce feeding tomatoes; the fruit needs to ripen and the plants do not want encouragement to make new leaf growth. Pick any runner or French beans otherwise they tend to become 'old' very quickly.

Continue watering hanging baskets and containers. This will help maintain colour until we replace summer bedding plants with pansies, violas, wallflowers and bellis – the list is endless...

I have noticed how most rose types have survived the long hot dry conditions with little or no watering, a point to remember with bare root

stock becoming available over winter months.

If you have a pond, thinning out of some aquatic plants can be carried out so that you can see the water and not a mass of leaves. If you have a heap of spent plants just leave the muddy mass on the side of the pond for a few days so that any pond creatures can escape back into the water.

Rhododendrons and Azaleas in pots need watering more often at this time of year to encourage flower buds to form for next spring.

My recommended plant this month is



Callicarpa, sometimes referred to as the Beauty Bush. The leaves will turn to a reddish hue, followed by small purple berries that last for several weeks. Enjoy the forthcoming autumn colours **The Arborist**

Gestingthorpe Village Hall : The roof

The refurbishment and repair of the slate roof is finished. Doesn't it look great?

The work took a longer than we had thought but then the roofers had to do more work than was originally thought. As an old building it had a hidden surprise when the brickwork of the end walls was exposed. The roofers did a great job in having a bricklayer sort out the necessary work whilst working around our need to keep the village hall in use.

Some of the heavy capping stones were found to be in need of replacement so we took the decision to replace a number of those at the same time. We didn't want to 'spoil the ship for a ha'porth of tar'.

The extra and necessary work to the insides of the parapet walls significantly increased the cost of the work and with the replacement of some of the capping stones the estimate for the roofing work increased by over one third!

How did the finances go? Well, with the extra cost for the work we got close to running out of money before the cost of the final bill was taken into account. A big worry. We had discussed the level of our available funds with the roofers. We all knew that we were at a 'point of no return' where; if the work had been stopped the village hall would have had to be closed. We also all knew it would be an even harder job to re-open a village hall with a partly completed roof.

Our committee had a Plan B. Plan B was to see if we could get private loans from villagers. A number of people stepped forward and offered us loans. Thank you; that gave us the support and guarantee we needed to keep going with the work.

The roofers were kept up to date and very kindly offered to keep going with the work knowing that their final bill may be delayed in being paid but knew we had assured them full payment would be made as soon as possible. We didn't need to delay in paying that final bill. Villagers stepped forward and due to their incredible generosity we had enough money to settle the roofer's final bill shortly after it had been sent to us. On behalf of the Gestingthorpe Village Hall Committee I pass our sincere and grateful thanks to those who, together, donated a sufficient and large amount of money to get us 'over the line'. The roof of our village hall is in considerably better shape and specification than it has been for many many years. We expect that it will outlast us all.

Our village hall committee also deserve a 'Thank you' for, over the last few years, keeping on pushing ahead in raising funds to refurbish the roof.

Cookery Corner

Greek Briam (baked mixed vegetables)

A very easy-to-make vegetable dish that can be served on its own with some crusty bread or as a side dish to BBQ meats, especially lamb.

Ingredients:

Greek extra virgin olive oil

- 6 garlic cloves, sliced
- 2 tbsps dried oregano
- 3 sprigs of rosemary
- 2 tbsps chopped fresh parsley

250ml passata

500g waxy potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks

- 2 large courgettes, diced
- 1 large aubergine, diced
- 1 large red onion, thickly chopped
- 1 large red pepper, cut into chunks
- 1 large green pepper, cut into chunks
- 6 medium tomatoes, chopped into wedges

Method:

Preheat the oven to gas mark 5 (170oC Fan or 190oC).

Drizzle some olive oil into a large roasting tin and spread the potatoes evenly across the base of the tin. Season with salt and pepper.

Add the garlic & courgettes as your next layer and again season with salt and pepper.

Work up the layers, with the aubergine then the peppers and then the onion, seasoning as before between each layer.

Sprinkle 1 tbsp of oregano and 1 tbsp of parsley over the top, then layer on the chopped tomatoes. Add the rest of the herbs and season again.

Pour passata over the top and add 200ml water. Finish with another generous drizzle of olive oil.

Cover the roasting tin tightly with foil and bake for about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours, or until vegetables are tender, then it is ready to serve.

Suitable for 4 people as a main meal, or 6 as a side dish.
